COURSE ABSTRACT

Childhood Apraxia of Speech is a motor speech sound disorder requiring an approach to intervention and target selection considerations that are distinct from those implemented among children with other speech sound disorders. This course will discuss theoretical and clinical considerations for choosing appropriate targets, as well as helpful elicitation strategies, for children with Childhood Apraxia of Speech. Case examples and videos of actual therapy sessions will be reviewed to help explain and describe specific elicitation strategies.
